THREE BANDS BLURRING THE LINES



You've heard the conversation. Two people talking about a new band who sound similar to another you already know and love. After hearing the new song a couple of times, they both realize that the connection is more than coincidence. As the debate progresses, a few questions come up: Is this new band a product of the popularity of the band you love? Are they ripping off this popular sound because theirs lacks creativity or they crave money and fame? Are they taking the sound they heard and pushing it in new, exciting directions?

These conversations exist because music lovers are not content with enjoying music of the moment. Instead, they want to know where that music came from. Whether it's The Beatles taking a page from Little Richard when they yell "Whoo" in their breakout hit I Saw Her Standing There; or maybe noticing that Modest Mouse frontman Issac Brock's lyrics have the same conversational arrangement as The Pixies' Frank Black. In either case, something familiar catches your ear, but can't quite be placed.

This week, here's three albums that walk the artistic tightrope between imitating a band's sound, being influenced by a specific band or genre, and finding inspiration in a musical catalogue.


The Pack A.D. – We Kill Computers (2010)



Hailing from the untamed forests of British Columbia, Becky Black and Maya Miller comprise the grungy two-piece known as The Pack A.D. A by-product of their work with producer

Jesse Gander (Japandroids, Bison, B.C.), We Kill Computers combines The Pack A.D.'s social and environmental commentary with a rough, ragged, rock n' roll sound that combines the feminine grunge of Sleater Kinney with the early garage-rock sounds of The White Stripes. In fact, on tracks such as Everyone Looks like Everyone, Big Anvil and K Stomp, Miller's percussion and Black's riffs appear to match up with the early work of Jack and Meg White almost note-for-note. At the same time, the diversity of B.C. Is on Fire and Cobra Matte show that The Pack A.D. is more than just a garage-grunge rip-off.

Airbourne - No Guts. No Glory. (2010)



Everything about
Australian rockers
Airbourne screams
hard-rock/heavy metal
tribute. From their
album's cover featuring
a bikini-clad groupie
littered with dollar
bills, a triumphant Joel
O'Keefe proudly holding

an electric guitar over his head, and a transport truck


with Motorhead's Lemmy Killmeister at the wheel, just looking at the case of No Guts. No Glory. tells you that you're in for a wild sonic ride. However, image can only get you so far.

Fortunately for Airbournce, once you get past the case, you quickly learn one inalienable truth: Airbourne are here to rock. *No Guts. No Glory*, the follow-up to 2007's *Runnin' Wild*, is equal parts AC/DC tribute and late-70s, early-80s rock revival. From the opening notes of *Born to Kill* that pull you from a barren desert to a city of rock, to the lawless rampage of *Back on the Bottle*, *No Guts. No Glory.* is a labour of love dedicated to AC/DC, Judas Priest, Motorhead and the many other godfathers of hard rock that inspired O'Keefe and co. to pick up a guitar and rock out like there was no tomorrow.

Owl City – Ocean Eyes (2009)

If, while listening to *Ocean Eyes*, you get the distinct feeling that you've heard Owl City before, there's a simple explanation: you were probably listening to The Postal Service. While equating Owl City to the 2003 collaboration of Death Cab for Cutie's Ben Gibbard and Jimmy Tamborello of Dntel, might seem overstated and reductionist, few can argue that similarities exist.

Minnesota native Adam Young has been producing music under the name Owl City since 2007. His



debut full-length, *Ocean Eyes*, is nothing less than an electro-pop tutorial. Young fuses key elements of disco, indie and bubble-gum pop together in an appealing, inoffensive and catchy package that begs you to keep listening.

Comparisons between Owl City and The Postal Service are unavoidable. Everything from the electronic beats to Young's high-pitched voice and kitschy-yet-heartfelt lyrics hearken back to 2003's Give Up. There are, however, flashes of originality on Ocean Eyes, most notably the acoustic gem The Bird and the Worm and piano driven Dental Care.

That said, until Young balances his own creativity with the heavy-handed influence of The Postal Service, people familiar with The Postal Service's work will be more inclined to view Owl City as little more than a B-Side imitator.



PRESIDENT'S AWARD FOR EXCEPTIONAL COMMUNITY SERVICE

Nominees must be full-time employees, faculty or staff, with a minimum of five years of continuous service and have made the cited community contributions during their period of employment at Memorial University. The nominees must not have been previous winners of the award.

DALE JARVIS

HAUNTED HIKE HOST BY ALISON MURRAY



Living in St. John's means being surrounded by the city's abundant history and heritage. For the historical events that have shaped the city's development, the population, as a cultural group, relies on the storytellers in the community who guard and share the tales from

long ago; some empowering with others taking on more eerie tones.

One such person is Dale Jarvis. Storyteller, author, and NLAC Art Award nominee, Jarvis tells stories of days gone by in old St. John's. And, on summer nights he can be found telling stories of a more ghostly nature. Current spoke with Dale Jarvis about the re-opening of the Haunted Hike and asked what his five favourite haunted locations or stories were that can be found in St. John's. Starting off, Jarvis begins with Tommy Connor's gate. "A story which has been circulating Signal Hill for at least sixty years."

The gate "was located across from where the Battery Hotel now stands. People would see the ghost of a man standing by the gate, missing his head, but holding his hat in his hand."

Secondly, Dale Jarvis notes "There seems to be a problem with basements on Livingstone Street." He continues, "at least two are haunted, one by a ghostly dog, and one by a terrifying floating head."

Continuing with what was once Victoria Station Inn, Jarvis says, "if one had to pick one building in Newfoundland that has generated the largest number of ghost stories, the dubious honour would probably go to the old double house on the corner of Duckworth Street and Cathedral Street in downtown St. John's. It generates more ghost stories than any other building in St. John's, including a phantom gentleman smoking a pipe, moving objects, eerie cold spots, strange noises, broken dishes, and the like."

Next, storyteller Dale Jarvis notes, "in 2000 during July a number of buildings were demolished to make way for The Rooms. One of these was a structure known as the Inspector General's House," where

workers, "would often hear the sound of footsteps coming up the basement stairs. At other times, strange banging noises were heard emanating from the kitchen." As well, one of the ghosts seen "was the figure of an older man, about 5'10" tall with white, curly, bushy hair, sideburns and a handlebar moustache, wearing a dark coat with tails, a charcoal grey waist coat or vest and trousers that matched."

Lastly, "at the end of 1854 Sir Charles Henry Darling was sent to Newfoundland as Governor." When he left Government House for Jamaica in 1857, left behind was "the mahogany-framed gong which had been presented to Darling all those years before. At the very instant of Darling's death - January 25, 1870, in Gloucestershire, England - a strange thing happened in St. John's. The brass gong, allegedly, rang out, untouched by human hands."

If you would like to hear more about these stories, Haunted Hike will guide you around town every Sunday to Thursday starting May 30, at 9:30pm. Film Festival, Cannes Film Festival as well as the Sundance Film Festival."



Them by Joyce Carol Oates. This novel is a realistic and exact rendition of twentieth century Middle America. With individual



White Teeth looks at social struggles, questions humanity's necessities, embedded ideas and relationships. Smith exposes the rawness through conversation and everyday life.




Loneliness brings a sense of connection

WINES OF BORDEAUX, PART 2

A SPOTLIGHT THROUGH THE FRENCH WINE REGION BY JENNIFER MURRAY

The journey continues through the French wine region starting with the Right Bank.

Right Bank

The arrival at the right bank brings to the journey to an area with more rolling hills on the way to the City of Saint Emilion, a great place to visit! The right bank is less structured than the Left Bank. But, it's home to some extraordinary wines, like - for most people - the prohibitively expensive Chateau Pétrus. The Right is divided into Bourg et Blaye in the North West and the Libournais in the South East. The big names are in the Libournais around the cities of Libourne and Saint Emilion. The appellation of Pomerol houses the famous Chateau Pétrus and Ch. Trotanoy. A bit further South East comes Saint Emilion with the appellation of the same name housing Chateau Cheval Blanc, Ch. Canon la Gaffelière, Ch. Angelus, etc.

The trip finishes through this region and there is now an idea of what is where, but it's good to know what the story is with respect to the difference in taste between the Right and Left Bank. If attending a blind tasting of Bordeaux, you might hear the wine geeks musing if this wine is a Right or Left Bank wine - how could they know unless they cheated and looked at the label?

Plums and Blackcurrants

Without getting into soil composition and all that fun stuff you can somewhat generalize that the Left

Bank is dominated by Cabernet Sauvignon and the Right Bank by Merlot. Merlot ripens a bit earlier and is therefore more suited to the cooler Right Bank and the soils there. Cabernet Sauvignon does well on the Left Bank, although the wines from both banks are mostly blends of the two with some other varieties in supporting roles. Cabernet Sauvignon is more tannic and has a firm structure with aromas of cedar and black currants. Merlot is softer, velvety, fruity and some describe it as plummy.

On both banks these main varieties are blended with Cabernet Franc and Petit Verdot for instance. There are always exceptions to make things more complicated (the famous Cheval Blanc is for instance mainly Cabernet Franc), but in general the aforementioned applies.

Getting back to the blind tasters musing, swirling and swishing: they're trying to determine if the wine is soft and fruity (to simplify it a bit) indicating that it might be mainly Merlot based and therefore from the Right Bank, or if it's tannic with cedar notes and black currant indicating it may be a Left Bank wine? It might be fun to test at home by buying a, not too cheap, Left Bank Bordeaux and a Right Bank Bordeaux.

Rotten Grapes anyone?

You cannot leave the regions without touching on the great sweet wines of Sauternes and Barsac. Whoever came up with the idea of harvesting rotten grapes



must have been desperate for a glass of wine, but it's unlikely anyone will ever hold it against him or her!

The climate in the Sauternes and Barsac region is conducive to fog, creating the ideal environment for the Botrytis Cinerea, the fungus causing the noble rot. It's nicer to call the rot "noble," because the infested grapes are used to make delicious wines with a great balance of acidity and sugar. Although they are sweet, they aren't cloying due to balancing acidity. These are great wines with dessert or foie gras and are usually quite costly due to the difficulty in harvesting and processing.

Hopefully you've enjoyed the trip through the Bordeaux region. The best thing to do is to replicate it in real life!

The festival started in 2007, which featured the entire cast of *This Hour Has 22 Minutes* plus Lorne Elliott, Erica Sigurdson, Irwin Barker and Steve Patterson. It was an instant success.

The festival features an array local, national and international comic all brought together to provide some nights of unforgettable entertainment.

When it comes to putting the festival together; "We try to balance visiting and home-grown talent, and just get the best

audience, and they aren't afraid. Comedians love coming here because the audiences are so sharp, warm and enthusiastic," Soucy said.

The festival opens on Saturday June 5 with a sidesplitting performance from Louis C.K. at Holy Heart Theatre. With more than twenty years as a stand-up, Louis C.K. is one of the most honest and respected comedic voices of his generation, finding success in television and film as well as the live stage.

In June, Louis will premiere his new FX series, Louie, following the hit series, Rescue Me. Louis will executive produce, write, direct and star in the series based on his life as a stand-up comic and single father of two living in New York City.

Soucy said of Louis, "he's certainly my favourite comic at the moment – funniest man on the planet. Fans of Louis C.K. cannot believe he is coming and neither can I – he's done it all: Letterman, Conan O'Brien, Leno and he was just in a movie with Ricky Gervais called *The Invention of Lying*. This is an amazing opportunity to see a talent of this calibre in such an intimate setting. Very soon this guy will only be seen in stadiums in major cities."

There will be a great variety of local talent featured as well Soucy continued, "Shaun Majumder is back to host the Gala and star in his own shows Shaun Majumder & Friends. Trent McClellan from Corner Brook is back, as is John Sheehan and Jonny Harris. Paul Edwards and Berni Stapleton make their first appearances at the Festival and Bill MacIntosh from the local Yuk Yuk's Club joins us too."

Shaun Majumder, born in Burlington, is one of the better known Newfoundland comedians who's achieved international success. Majumder started his career as a host on YTV and joined *This Hour Has 22 Minutes* in 2003, hosted 15 episodes of the *Just for Laughs* TV specials and starred in the Montreal Festival. He was also a star of *Cedric the Entertainer Presents* and

appeared in an NFB documentary, The Next Big Thing. Majumder has also starred in the CBC comedy pilots Hatching, Matching and Dispatching and Plain Brown Rapper, as well as playing Kumar's brother in Harold & Kumar Go to White Castle. Shaun's role in 24 has led to a pilot for a new sit-com recently filmed in LA.

The festival has acted as a springboard for up and coming comics as well. Since 2008 one of the featured of the festival is a Stand-Up workshop, which has spawned lots of new talent, some of whom are now working professionally. Matt Estevez is on his way, as is Steve Coombs and John Sheehan who is all the rage and has been for a few years.

When asked if he will be performing during the festival Soucy replied, "Snook might be making a brief appearance at the Gala, and maybe even at some other events – not sure yet. I, however, will stick to the sidelines this year. Lots to do backstage."

Some other well known names coming to to the island to experience great audiences include Mike Bullard and Derek Edwards.

EDWARD BURTYNSKY'S OIL

STIRRING NEW EMOTIONAL EXHIBITION OPENS AT THE ROOMSBY CHARISSA REEVES

When attending an exhibit there is always the anticipation before getting to see what kind of emotional effect the pieces will have. Rarely is that feeling so strongly moving, complete with varying emotions as was the case at the opening of Edward Burtynsky's Oil at The Rooms.

A world renowned Canadian photographer, Burtynsky's exhibit chronicles not only the production and distribution of oil but also the effects it has on the world and the things many forget to see.

People have always taken from nature, Burtynsky told the attending public in the theatre at The Rooms, but what's changed is the speed and scale. "[Oil] runs like blood through our veins and it gives us energy and life like blood does and when we do see it, it's usually a problem like we're seeing in the gulf right now."



Burtynsky's photos range from shots of the oil sands in Fort McMurray Alberta, aerial views of the freeways in Los Angeles, images of the abandoned oil fields in Azerbaijan, to junk yards full of Sikorsky helicopters, bombers and fighter jets.

Burtnsky's images of tire piles, junk yards, compressed stacks of oil filters and other refuse are

not for the environmentally squeamish, or those who like to bury their heads. The incredible quantity of waste these images depicted actually makes one slightly nauseous and wanting to never drive a car again (yet we're still driving).

"Nothing goes away it just goes somewhere else, and I was interested in that somewhere else."

Perhaps some of the most heart wrenching images of the exhibit come from Bangladesh where men literally toil in mire dismantling oil tankers and salvaging the crude oil left in these now dead transportation monsters.



Bare feet and hands covered in oil, moving among steel and cutting it by hand. No cranes, no safety equipment, these men are breathing noxious fumes and exposing themselves to asbestos. "So for them it's really a vital source of both steel and oil and all of that, but us looking at it seems like a really hard price to pay to have those things."

Many of Burtynsky's photographs are forbiddingly majestic such as the now vacant oil fields in Azerbaijan. Baku, Azerbaijan was once one of the



richest oil fields on the planet and where off shore drilling was first invented.

Abandoned for over 20 years now these ghostly shots show what happens at the end of oil, Burtynsky said. Seeing everything left behind, rusting and falling into the ground was a revelation of an end of an industry, which, all oil fields will eventually go to, he explained. "As the whole planet we're working with finite things and at the rates of consumption those finite things disappear much quicker than we've ever imagined."

When asked whether he considered himself an artist with a message or an activist using art, Burtynsky said, "I don't release a picture unless it's an interesting picture so I'm always aware of the image."

He said he's always been interested in the idea of finding subject and working with them until exhausting the possibilities while making sure the form of the image and the content are equal in their weight. "If the content became too predominant then it's like photojournalism, it's a story."

If the form is too predominant then the image becomes an over simplification, just looking at the materiality of the form without any subject. "I didn't want to go to either one of those extremes so I wanted to keep everything on that kind of edge."

THE GIRL WITH THE DRAGON TATTOO

STARRING MICHAEL NYQVIST, NOOMI RAPACE & SVEN-BERTIL TAUPE BY TIM CONWAY

Whatever delights or disappointments that marked his previous Christmas Days, Michael Blomqvist is sure to remember this one.
Observing his interaction with his sister and her children, a man is revealed who's wholeheartedly embracing the spirit of the season, yet just a couple

of days before, he had been found guilty of libel in a high-profile legal case. His sentence includes a heavy fine and prison time, which he is to begin serving in six months. Although his sister, a lawyer, insists she could have successfully defended him, he tells her his life had been dragged into the gutter, and he didn't want his family to get sucked in. This response substantiates his popular reputation as one of the country's few journalists of integrity.

The conviction is enough to cement this holiday season in his memory, but festivities are interrupted by a call from another lawyer, Dirch Frode, insisting that they meet. Mr. Frode is representing a member of one of Sweden's most affluent families and has been instructed to recruit Mr. Blomqvist's assistance in a personal matter. Intrigued, Bloomqvist is off to the exclusive island residence of Henrik Vanger.

The octogenarian Mr. Vanger tells an intriguing story. More than forty years before, during a family gathering on the island, his favourite niece, Harriet, disappeared. Despite the resources at the disposal of the family, her body was never recovered. While the general consensus was that she met her accidental demise in the waters surrounding the island, Henrik's distrust of his greedy, jealous relatives, and a recurring annual event, have convinced him that she was murdered. It is this mystery that Blomqvist is entreated to solve.

Of course, a man like Mr. Vanger doesn't just pick a new investigator out of newspaper headlines. At his request, the lawyer, Mr. Frode, secured the services of Milton Security and in particular their best researcher Lisbeth Salander to conduct a thorough check of Blomqvist. In doing so, Ms. Salander becomes intrigued with her subject and continues to remotely monitor his progress while he sifts through the details surrounding Harriet's disappearance. It's only a matter of time that her curiosity gets the best of her and she becomes as involved in the case as Blomqvist.

The Girl with the Dragon Tattoo is based on the first of three posthumously published, best-selling novels, known as The Millennium series, by Steig Larsson. Both the film and the book were originally titled Men Who Hate Women, which more accurately reflects the details of the story, while the English language moniker seems ill-chosen, especially since the themes of sexism and misogyny in Swedish society form a significant part of the novel and the motion picture.

The first forty minutes or more of this two and a half hour movie are dedicated to establishing the main characters, yet the whole experience is engrossing to where the audience is completely impervious of the film's length. Once engaged, the suspense maintains interest in the story, assisted by well composed visuals and a cast that has you hanging onto every moment.


Michael Nyqvist is the perfect "everyman," whose Blomqvist is less a hero than a good man. His ideals, and his ability to stick to them, are portrayed as characteristics available to everyone, rather than those of a larger than life individual. Noomi Rapace enjoys the more sensational role of Lisbeth Salander and embraces it with verve. While the Goth/punk/badass/ hacker female character isn't unique, nor are many of the aspects of this film for that matter, Rapace makes it her own. She's a character designed to make you sit up and notice, but as portrayed here, Lisbeth Salander is a movie figure likely never forgotten.


There are a few scenes of brutal violence that should be disturbing to everyone and are likely to elicit indignation in some. There also seems to be some disagreement among those who like to pigeonhole films into tidy little categories, with this one holding labels including mystery, thriller, suspense and horror. Such designations, like the title choice, are the petty details the marketing departments can obsess over. For the audience the main thing is that this is a wonderfully executed production of a compelling story, sure to have everyone counting down to the sequel later this year.



LEPORE EXPOSES HER TRUE COLOURS

Tits, blimps, bazoombas – love a fabulous rack and, dammit, one of the finest racks of all time belongs to the absolutely mesmerizing and iconic New York City tranny Amanda Lepore. "My breasts are a full D," Amanda shared this week when asked her if they were double Ds (so much for my expert eye). And her tits are gorgeous. Just like Amanda, in an alien kind of way. And don't knock calling Amanda alien-looking. That's exactly how she describes herself too. "There is something alien about my face," says Amanda, who also regularly appears at gay events in Montreal and Toronto. "There's something spacey about me. I still emulate the [classic Hollywood] bombshells but my look is retro so that I look spacey as well as new and fresh. If I dressed like Lady Gaga, [my face] would get lost. But because I dress retro, vamp and classic, the [alien] qualities come out more.'

Clearly this is a woman who knows exactly what she looks like. And she ought to, considering all the plastic surgery Amanda – born Armand Lepore some 35 years ago – has had since her sex change operation at age 15. In fact, Amanda had wanted a sex change since 11, and explains, "I always felt that I was a girl. My parents had to tell me that I wasn't."

At first, Amanda "passed" unnoticed. "It was really easy to pass when I had my sex change [because] I had a minor nose job and no breast implants," Amanda says. "But I always liked artificial girls like Marilyn Monroe. They were pretty and girly – real feminine. I wanted to be like that."

So Lepore had rhinoplasty, two eye lifts and three different breast implants. She's had her forehead lifted, hairline pulled down, brow bone reduced and her lower rib broken and pushed in. She's also had her forehead, buttocks, hips and most notably, her lips enlarged with liquid silicone.

When Amanda arrived in NYC at 18, she famously made her nightlife debut alongside then-club kids James St. James, Leigh Bowery (who was instrumental in developing Boy George) and nightclub promoter and host Michael Alig, who in 1996 was found guilty of murdering his drug dealer Andre 'Angel' Melendez. They all appeared together on The Joan Rivers Show in 1992 and Amanda, as usual, stole the show, to the delight of a beaming Joan Rivers. "That was one of my best moments when I started out!" Amanda recalls. "I was most fascinated with Leigh Bowery because he took four or five hours to get ready. In the old days it used to take me five or six, sometimes a whole day to get ready to go out. Now I can get ready in an hour."

NYC's underground club-kid scene – well-documented by a colleague, Michael Musto of the Village Voice ("It's been boring ever since!" Michael told me earlier this year) – collapsed with Alig's murder conviction. "But we had a lot of fun in the beginning," Lepore says. "Michael would have parties at his house before we went out. It was an incredible time because the economy was good and club owners were spending money. Our success came with it. But I'm not in contact with Michael anymore. Morally, it's really hard to handle what happened. When you become addicted to drugs [like Alig], crazy things happen."

Things would only get more interesting for Lepore with Alig's exit, when famed photographer Dave LaChappelle entered her life. Lepore has

club," Amanda says. "In high school he was always drawing
[pictures] of a girl that looked like me, and he never found
out who she was! So when he met me, it was like, 'Oh
my God!' People think he was interested because I'm a

That relationship has made Amanda the advertising face for Swatch watches, MAC cosmetics, Mego Jeans and her own clothing line. She's released a couple of music albums, made cameos in *Party Monster* and *Another Gay Sequel*, models during NYC's fashion week and appeared in a titillating fashion spread in *Playboy* last summer. All that to say, but beauty really is in the eye of the beholder. Few can honestly look at Lepore and not say she's beautiful. Even feminists. "I find that young women really like me," says Amanda. "They think I'm Barbie or something. If you're a woman, a feminist and intelligent, you can see that I'm the biggest feminist ever! I'm doing what I want to do. I'm not doing this to please men, but to please me!"














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
