# LULLABIES FOR BLOOD SHOT EYES

**DEBUT RECORD FOR SEAN MCCANN** BY JONNY HODDER

The dirty diapers, midnight feedings, college funds and the unfathomable pressure of being responsible for moulding another human life. These are what you might call the expected necessary changes a new for . Semetimes, however

father must prepare himself for. Sometimes, however, unexpected changes can have an equally huge impact.

For Sean McCann, one third of Newfoundland's musical juggernaut Great Big Sea, the birth of his two sons signalled a sea-change. Personally, he was overcome by paternal instinct; professionally, there was growing pressure to spend less time on the road and more at home with his family; and musically, McCann discovered a wealth of creative energy and ideas flowing like never before. The result of this creative wellspring is entitled *Lullabies for Bloodshot Eyes*, a labour of love which is as much a dedication to his family as it is an elegy for the life he left behind to become the father and husband he wanted to be.

The album's bookend tracks Somewhere (for Fin) and Don't Cry (for Keegan) are similar in theme and execution. Both are acoustic lullabies written almost as love letters to his sons, the first an apology for having to go on tour, the second a promise that Daddy will be there for you when it counts. Wish follows the same vein, as McCann admits to his wife "If I had my way tonight, I'd have you by candlelight."

Peace Among the Bones has a moodiness to the lyrics and a drive behind the beat that conjure up images of a person lost deep in the woods, crawling through underbrush, searching vainly for something just out of reach. Hold Me Steady is a track that mixes the right amount of traditional sounds with a rock n roll attitude, while McCann sings about reckless nights downtown when you have one or two (or eight) drinks too many.

Meanwhile, *Lazy Lover* is, in McCann's own words "a desperate plea to make love to my beautiful and patient wife." Accompanied by Jeen O'Brien, the song is a conversation (or maybe a debate) between two lovers over their expectations in and out of the bedroom. The upbeat tempo, infectious chorus, and strategically placed horns – courtesy of Chris Harnett – will win over most any audience and have any bar, arena or kitchen party dancing in no time.

Lullabies for Bloodshot Eyes is, among many things, a stark departure from McCann's 17 year tenure with Great Big Sea. While GBS have made their name primarily as a good-times for all, "World's Biggest Kitchen Party" kind of band, McCann shows more songwriting diversity than many might expect and carries off his first solo effort like an old pro.







The last region in France to look at is Alsace, although there are many more! Alsace is a region with an identity problem; it's neither truly French nor truly German. Since 1871 it changed nationality four times

and has only been an undisputed part of France since 1945. The architecture and the cuisine are more German than French and it's the only region in France where the grape variety is mentioned on the bottle. Alsace wines are not governed by the French wine laws, not least because the region was for so long a part of Germany.

Culture, gastronomy and wine are all interwoven in Alsace. Lying on the left bank of the Rhine, which forms the natural border between France and Germany, it produces some extraordinary wines from grape varieties like Pinot Blanc, Gewürztraminer, Riesling, Muscat, Pinot Gris, Tokay d'Alsace (no relation to the Tokaj of Hungary), Sylvaner and Pinot Noir. Alsace is mainly a white wine region, with only about 8% of red wine from mainly Pinot Noir. The wines range from dry to sweet dessert wine (Sélection

de grains nobles) with sparkling Crémant d'Alsace, a worthy substitute for champagne, being a main player as well.

Driving into the Alsace from Switzerland, it's not a strikingly scenic area. The plains between the Vosges mountains in France and the Black Forest in Germany are where the grape growing takes place, particularly the gentle slopes on the east side of the Vosges mountains. Some of the medieval towns in Alsace are tourist attractions due to the well preserved architecture and the quality of the museums in the area; towns to visit are Riquewihr and Colmar.

The wines from Alsace are great accompaniments to some of the most difficult to match foods. Asian cuisine is difficult to match with wine, because of the spiciness and the use of exotic flavour components, but Alsatian Gewürztraminer is a good match for these dishes. Alsace is famous for asparagus and this vegetable is another difficult one to match and when asked what wine would best match asparagus, one famous French winemaker therefore replied, "my competitor's wines."

Alsatian Pinot Gris or Pinot Blanc works well with asparagus and although Pinot Gris is basically the same grape as Pinot Grigio, this Italian version is



too acidic to provide a good match. The sour taste and the fatness of Sauerkraut and Sausages another typical Alsatian meal - is well paired with Alsatian Riesling. Foie Gras production originated in Strasbourg and this decadently rich delicacy pairs well with a Vendange Tardive (Late Harvest) Riesling or Gewürztraminer. The Sélection de Grains Nobles wines, sweet and full flavoured, are ideal dessert wines.

A favourite producer is Josmeyer (to be featured at the 2010 Wine Fest); Josmeyer is one of several biodynamic producers in Alsace and the winery is under management of Christophe Ehrhart, who is known as one of France's leaders in knowledge and practice of biodynamic wine growing and wine making. Keep an eye out for their fantastic wines at the Wine Fest! Try an Alsatian wine with your next meal and you'll surly not be disappointed!



# **NEVER SWIM ALONE**

POPULAR DANIEL MACIVER PLAY AT THE ARTS AND CULTURE CENTRE BY DEBBY WINTERS



Two guys and a girl, so many times a real-life struggle, so many times the basis of many novels, stories and plays. NL Box Office presents Never Swim Alone; two friends and a girl with a secret from their past provide a comedic look at the familiar love triangle. The play is produced by Christy Ring and stars Andy Cahill and Adam Clarke as Frank Delorenzo and Bill Wade; the two friends that a pitted against each other. Laura-Marie Smith

playwright Daniel Maclver

portrays the girl who holds their secret.

New York Times theatre columnist, Wilbur Hampton describes the play's foundation; "Children's swimming lessons always used to have a buddy system, a pairing of two novices, so each would always know where the other was in the water and come to the rescue in case of trouble. But in Never Swim Alone, by Canadian playwright Daniel Maclver, the two

designated buddies try to drown each other as they dog paddle through the troubled waters of life."

Never Swim Alone is a satire about two Alpha-males and their ruthless competition for the title of Top Dog. The play's structure is a surreal egotistical boxing match: Frank and Bill square off in a 13 round Battle Royale of vicious undermining and one-upmanship. A seemingly anonymous woman blows a whistle to announce the rounds and declares a winner at the end of each one.

But as their match grows increasingly bitter, a tragic story emerges implicating all three characters. We learn that the woman's role as referee is the result of a childhood incident involving all of them - a playful competition with tragic consequences that gives the play its raw emotional core.

Never Swim Alone is on stage at the basement theatre of the St. Johns Arts and Culture Centre. Performances are July 15 to 18 at 8pm with a special pay-what-you-can Sunday Matinee at 2pm. Tickets are \$20, \$15 for students and seniors. A portion of proceeds will be donated to the SPCA.

# **KRISTA HANN OF SHAKESPEARE BY THE SEA**

SHARING HER FIVE FAV REASONS WHY SHAKESPEARE'S STILL RELEVANT TODAY **BY ALISON MURRAY** 

First published, posthumously, in the early seventeenth century, William Shakespeare's collection of work has inspired and transformed not only the theatre, but literature, film and even the English language itself. His work has held up for centuries, translated into a variety of languages, performed on a variety of stages globally and being adapted to more modern settings and dynamics. Therefore, it comes as no surprise that his work would be celebrated in a summer festival.

Since 1993, Shakespeare by the Sea, has continued



to bring Shakespeare's work to life through a variety of interpretations and backdrops. Beginning in early July, The Compleat Works of Wllm Shkspr (abridged) hits the stage. The play's director, Krista Hann, was asked what five favourite characteristics of Shakespeare's work have made it timeless?

Hann notes "everyone loves a good comedy. With Shakespeare, no matter the setting, situation, or time frame, his comedic characters are funny and his humour translates. If you're a sceptic, just talk a group of 7 years olds through the plot of A Midsummer Night Dream! They eat that show up!"

Following Shakespeare's comedic relief, Hann says, "no matter how many times I read or watch Romeo and Juliet I still cry. When a playwrite produces so many classics (Romeo and Juliet, Macbeth, The Taming of the Shrew, Hamlet etc.) that can still make audience laugh, cry and gasp, I don't think you can argue his presence even today."

In discussing Hollywood's continuous adaptations and subtle borrowings, Hann recognizes that, "all his writing has the elements of a hit blockbuster: sex, action, heartthrobs and heroines, and memorable one liners (some of his lines are so memorable that people use them everyday and don't even realize it). All with the bonus of an actual plot!"

Next, Hann says "Shakespeare's work spurs so many heated discussions. Love him or hate him you can't really avoid talking about him. I believe that's



the mark of a true timeless icon."

Ultimately, Hann concludes "his writing is like a workbook. It can be presented in so many ways and has been modernized, placed in post-apocalyptic worlds, performed indoors and outdoors, with cross casts and in various languages. Shakespeare wrote his works to be performed, and he therefore gives the performer so much to grow from that it leads to open interpretation - what's more timeless than that?!"

Overall, Shakespeare's plays and poetry continue to inspire while surpassing social change, language barriers and centuries, to become truly timeless. Wreckhouse gets underway on Tuesday July 13 at the Majestic Theatre. The Bill Brenan Quintet and Jeff Dyer hit the stage at 8pm. The Terry Clarke Trio with Don Thompson and Phil Dwyer follows them with a performance. Having recorded over 300 albums with various jazz artists, Vancouver born international jazz drummer Terry Clarke is a familiar face at jazz festivals, concert halls and venues throughout the world. In August of 1999, after 15 productive years in New York, he returned to Toronto.

In 2009 Terry released his "debut" album as a leader *It's About Time* on the Blue Music Group. The album features star players Jim Hall, Joe Lovano, Greg Osby, and the members of his current trio Don Thompson and Phil Dwyer. This album received the Juno this year for Best Mainstream Jazz Recording.

Other International performers at the festival include singer-songwriter Alex Cuba who hails from Artemisa, Cuba and resides in Smithers, BC. Alex collaborated with Nelly Furtado for her Spanish language debut album *Mi Plan* (My Plan) which was released internationally September 2009 (Universal). In between tour dates and the Nelly Furtado collaborations, Alex recorded his third album at Baker Studios in Victoria, BC. The self-titled project was released October 27.

Ottawa singer-songwriter Kellylee Evans is another performer. Evans is entering the next phase of her music career with her sophomore album, *The Good Girl*. When asked about her music style and jazz, Evans replies, "when I started writing my own stuff, I was always thinking that it wasn't jazz, but everybody thought it was, and when I looked for musicians to make Fight or Flight, everybody that I knew was in the jazz world, so it sounded like jazz."

New Brunswick's Matt Andersen will perform his sprawling blues, roots and rock musical hybrid with his sorrowing and soulful voice, which has sparked a phenomenal buzz on Canada's East Coast. In past years, Matt has released an introductory EP along with two critically acclaimed live fan favourites and the full-length release Second Time Around.

Born and based in Toronto, Canada Dominic Mancuso defines a rich hybrid sound fueled by a highly diverse and cultural backdrop. His 2009 release, *Comfortably Mine*, attests to this influence. By embracing his

ancestors' southern Italian dialect and repertoire, and infusing it with his North American sensibility, he has successfully merged the old world with the new.

H'Sao, a family, a band originally from Chad, South Africa and now living in Montreal, draw from gospel, traditional African music, as well as their Chadian roots. H'sao display clear soul, pop, and R&B influences. All the members are singer songwriters; elements of their various influences are smoothly blended with African rhythms to create fresh songs in a unique style. Masterful a capella singing sets them apart in world music.

There will also be a series of workshops held during the Wreckhouse International Jazz and Blues Festival featuring many of the performers. # **BRINGING HISTORY ALIVE** UNIQUE PROJECT CELEBRATES ONE YEAR

Anybody who has grown up in Newfoundland and Labrador knows that storytelling is a solid part of the cultural foundation.

If you take a stroll down Water Street you can experience the power of storytelling for yourself. Starting by Harbour Side Park and going as far as Springdale street you will find talk bubbles mounted on 26 light poles with the words (Here)Say. Underneath those words is a phone number followed by a code.


When you dial the number and input the code you will hear local people recounting the stories of that area. The (Here)Say project was created a year ago in June 2009 and was the vision of Chris Brookes and Dale Javris along with designer Mike Mouland.

The project demonstrates that St. John's is a landscape not only of streets and buildings but of human experience – what is often called the city's

Character. St. John's is full of stories, about Melindys, The Model Shop, Woolworths, and the car park on top of Bowrings.

Did you know that the iron gate that gets closed every evening at O'Brien's Music Store actually was the old elevator door from the original City Hall? That is just one of the many tidbits that you will learn as you take the (Here)Say stroll. For locals it brings back many memories, for people visiting the capitol city it opens a door to the past and an era long gone but still very fondly remembered.

In its first three months (Here)Say fielded 1,300 calls which is an unusually high number for cell phone tourism projects of this type. Seventy percent of calls originated from 709 area code, which reflects local calls and city tourism statistics indicating that two-thirds of city visitors come from elsewhere in the province. The sign receiving the most "hits" is located next to Ziggy's chip van.


#### Personal Style and Influences

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# **GROWN UPS**

STARRING ADAM SANDLER, KEVIN JAMES, CHRIS ROCK & DAVID SPADE BY TIM CONWAY

102 min. \*1/2 (one and a half stars)

Even some of the closest childhood friends drift apart. Some manage to keep in touch on a regular basis while others never reconnect. In between is an endless combination of coincidences and events that serve to reunite

individuals, allowing them to reminisce on old times, changing times, and sometimes even to regress into old patterns of behaviour that marked their younger days. Weddings often set the stage for such gatherings, and sadly, so do funerals.

When a small-town basketball coach dies, the starting line-up of his once winning team, from thirty years ago, converges on the ceremony. It's obvious that he had made some kind of positive impression, and likewise, he seems to have held a special place in his heart for this particular group, since he'd requested that Lenny Feder deliver his eulogy, and that his former team execute his wishes regarding his remains. In honour of the special bond they had as children, Lenny books a lakeside cottage for the five friends and their families, so that they can spend the weekend together. What initially begins as a chance to hang out with one another,

becomes an exercise in getting away from it all. Lenny has become concerned about how he's spoiled his kids, and this provides the perfect opportunity to show them what being young is really about.

Similar films have been done, but this one promises to be different since it features Adam Sandler and his comedy entourage. Unfortunately, while there's a certain nostalgic tug at our heartstrings, it isn't enough to overcome the lazy writing and uninspired film-making that characterizes *Grown Ups*.

Each character's life is clearly different. Sandler's Lenny is a successful Hollywood agent, married with three kids. Chris Rock's Kurt is a much maligned house husband, who's constantly the brunt of jokes from his wife, mother-in-law, and his children. Kevin James' Eric is scraping by, and seems to be closest to the "average" guy, but his four year-old son is still breastfeeding. David Spade's Marcus is the skirt-chasing single guy that Spade usually plays, and Rob Schneider's Rob, is a modern incarnation of a hippy.

Adding the various characters' physical attributes to this mix, serves as the source of most of the film's comic material. The guys sit around taking shots at one another's height and weight, and occasionally their family members. Eric gets to fall down a few times, and they all make cracks about Kurt's flatulent mother-inlaw and her bunions. This drags through the first half of

the film, but pretty much plays out, which comes as a disappointment to some, and a relief to others.

It's fairly obvious that these guys get along well together, and again, there's the appeal of seeing these *Saturday Night Live* alumni reunited, but it would have been more satisfying if they'd put a bit of effort into this. The film plays like the most work was applied to the character descriptions, with the actors throwing out lines, leaving the crew with the task of catching it on film and later cutting out takes. Even the notion of a plot seems to have been occasionally forgotten.

With this cast, *Grown Ups* could have been so much better than this Happy Madison company field day. With any luck, this is just a workshop for the motion picture they're planning down the road, when they're ready to give the audience the best of themselves.



# THE POLARIS MUSIC PRIZE 2010

NEWFOUNDLANDER PICKS UP POLARIS LIST HONOURS BY GARY MOORE

The Polaris Music Prize has been making waves as Canada's top music honor. The prize is a celebration and recognition of creativity in Canada's music industry. Recognizing all angles of an album, and truly evaluating the effort as a work of art. Taking into count it's not just the music, but instead, it's the whole package which includes; the marketing of the album, no judgement or disqualification based on musical genre, professional affiliation, or sales history.

It was just over two months ago when Curran won the Juno for Roots and Traditional Album Of The Year, and chilling enough, Amelia accepted the award in her hometown, St. John's.

Recent high-profile appearances in Toronto, during the NXNE Music Festival, have seen Amelia perform alongside a who's who catalog of Canadian artists. Now having her name associated with The Polaris Music Prize Long List, Amelia is a high profile in the Canadian Music Industry.

Amelia Curran is continuing to enjoy her success and can add the Royal Family to the list of those she


has performed to; Canada Day Amelia was in Ottawa to perform a garden party hosted at Rideau Hall which Her Majesty The Queen attended.

# **BEVERLY BROPHY**

#### WHATS ON TAP AT **THE SHIP**, 265 DUCKWORTH STREET (OFF SOLOMAN'S LANE) BY JOSHUA JAMIESON

A fixture pub for the arts, The Ship Inn, now known just as "The Ship" is a neat little discovery down a lane. Beverly Brophy has been greeting folks with a smile on her face as they've come on deck for the last six years.

Brophy said that for her, its a "world where shocking really becomes the norm," but it's clearly not something she's ready to give up anytime soon. She got into the gig when she was as she puts it. "a bored housewife." who was offered a part time bartending job. "I loved it, that was over 20 years ago!"

She describes her bartending style as "very accommodating, but with boundaries." Brophy admits that establishing how far one can safely go is sometimes a challenging thing to establish because it is "hard to know what the boundaries are until you cross them!"

Of course you don't just get a loyal following at the local watering hole for nothing and Brophy's Cape Colada is her signature refreshment to call for when you pull up a stool. She gets it started with 1 oz. vodka, 3/4 oz. Malibu and then 3/4 oz. Peach Snapps for the liquor. Then the mix includes orange juice, pineapple juice, a little bar mix before it's shaken with ice and gets a splash of grenadine.

Brophy says there's never a shortage of topics to cover when she's at The Ship because it's such a big part of the arts community in St. John's. She finds that knowing what's on the horizon can provide a little help to lubricate a conversation, plus she gets to hear about the going on's from patrons as well. "Being on top of what's going on in the music scene, the arts scene and general current community events is always a bonus.

The last 20 years of Brophy's bartending career have brought her lots of good times, fortune and company, not the least of which has been that of her husband. Even though she's heard some doozie pick up lines in her time, she credits the best one of all to Doug, her eventual husband, who introduced himself by saying, "Hi, my name is Doug, that's God spelled backwards with a little bit of u in it!"

The Ship is also home of some pretty delicious eats by the way. Whether you're in search of a late breakfast, a good fish 'n chips lunch or a proper evenin' scoff to go with that Beverly Brophy signature Cape Colada - you'll find it down Soloman's Lane. It's also a great spot to be on Wednesday nights when the theme is Folk Night with a weekly feature, usually starting up around 9:30pm going on until midnight.

# **PREMATURE SOLUTIONS?**

WHEN WILL WE LEARN THAT DRUGS CAN'T SOLVE OUR SEX PROBLEMS? BY JOSEY VOGLES

When Viagra arrived for men with erectile dysfunction, forever perpetuating that good sex is all about how good a stiffie he gets, it made gazillions, confirming what Big Pharma suspected: Sex drugs sell. Big time. And while the race is on to come up with a female "Viagra" to help women suffering from "sexual dysfunction," a term created by drug companies themselves, another sector of the legalized drug world was working on solutions for another common complaint - premature ejaculation. Thinking of grandma clearly wasn't cutting it. A couple years ago MMB covered Phase 2 trials for Tempe - topical eutectic mixture for PE -- a prescription spray for guys 15 minutes before sex to make him last, according to early trials, a whole 2.4 times longer. Sounds impressive, until you found out that the guys were lasting under a minute. Also, a numb penis, burning during intercourse and erectile dysfunction, oh, and a little diaharrea - some of the side effects experienced - is a high price to pay for an extra minute-and-a-half.

This past week, Shionogi Pharma, Inc., a US-based group company of Shionogi & Co., Ltd., presented data summarizing the results of two pivotal studies of the investigational new drug PSD502, a topical metered dose spray, being developed for the treatment of primary premature ejaculation (PE). The press release was a little hard to decipher but from what was interpreted, it seems like the increase in lasting time were about as impressive as they were with Tempe. Oh, and an additional potential side effect, "vulvovaginal burning sensation." So on top of the chafing, she also gets to feel like her vagina's on fire.

It's no surprise drug companies are clamouring to tap into the potential gazillions to be made from the estimated 30% of men who apparently suffer from premature ejaculation. Considering erectile dysfunction only effects about 10% of the male population, Viagra profits look like pocket change compared to the money PE drugs stand to pull in. But, like Viagra, this approach to "treating" sexual problems makes me nuts. If we can just get him hard and make him last, sex will be good. And the very term "premature ejaculation" or "coming too soon" implies that there is some ideal amount of time to last. Or that you have to last. News bulletin. Most women don't come through penetration! Frankly, plenty of warm up followed by a quick dip of his stick when things really get clipping along is preferable. Or, how about switching it up? Nothing says, once he's in, he's got to stay there. A few return visits in between lots of other fun stuff beats a three-hour pounding. But maybe that's just me.

As Come As You Are sex shop co-owner Cory Silverberg wrote about TEMPE, the spray did nothing to improve sexual satisfaction among study participants. "Which raises an interesting question," writes Silverberg. "If you're having lousy sex, do you care if it only lasts a minute ? Should we prolonging intercourse at any cost?"

Then came a timely email from Cory's dad, Dr. Sy Silverberg, who's worked as a sex therapist for close to forty years and is based in Victoria, BC. He says he's seen this problem of premature ejaculation up-close and knows the devastating effects it can have. But he too is concerned with the trend towards "curing" PE with drugs. "When the drug companies start pouring millions of dollars into advertising, as they've done with erectile dysfunction, countless young men will start using this drug. They will very likely never get off it," Dr. Silverberg wrote me.

Back in 1978, Dr. Siverberg wrote a small book entitled: Lasting Longer: The Treatment Program for Premature Ejaculation that he's been using for 32 years with great success. "The truth is that the solution to the problem does not lie in medication but simply in education," he says. "Premature ejaculation is not a disease. No man is born with the ability to control ejaculation. Every man has to learn how. Some are fortunate and learn spontaneously as they mature, but very many do not."

"Ejaculation is a reflex action and men have to learn how to control that reflex," he continues. "Exactly as they did when they learned to control their bladders and bowels. Everyone in this society is toilet-trained (taught how to control those reflexes), but no one is taught how to control the ejaculatory reflex. At the same time, men are told that any "real man" should be able to control ejaculation, creating the breeding ground for shame, guilt, lack of self-esteem and worse.

# THE MOST HATED FAMILY IN AMERICA

NATE PHELPS LOVES CANADA BY RICHARD BURNETT

It was bad enough that at 21, Matthew Shepard was pistol whipped, tortured and tied to a wooden fence like a torn, sagging scarecrow outside his hometown of Laramie, Wyoming, by Aaron McKinney and Russell Henderson shortly after midnight on Oct. 7, 1998. Shepard died five days later, and four days after that, on Oct. 16 in St. Mark's Church in Casper, Wyoming, the Rev. Anne Kitch spoke at Matthew's funeral. "We come here today to mourn Matt," Kitch said. "We come here today to offer our broken hearts. We come here today in the name of love." But parading outside before the world media were the anti-gay American pastor Fred Phelps and his Westboro Baptist Church (WBC) followers, waving signs with such slogans as "Matt Shepard rots in hell," "AIDS kills fags dead" and "God hates fags."

"That was evil!" says Nate Phelps, the 51-year-old son of Fred Phelps, who left his family 33 years ago. "It's an evil thing when a human being laughs at you during such a tender, painful moment in your life. They say sticks and stones can break your bones, but the reality is words do the most damage. It's longest-lasting and often cannot be undone. When someone like my father deliberately steps in to injure someone else, that's a pretty good definition of evil."

Without wasting ink to recapping the evils of the WBC - that's what Google's for. But, Nate Phelps - who has 12 siblings, of which nine (and their own sons and daughters) remain with the WBC - worked up the courage to leave his family the very day he turned 18.

"Growing up at home was a war zone," says Phelps. "[My dad] was always on the warpath about something, either with the kids or mother or someone out there in the world. He was always involved in battle. It's still a mystery to me why he's this way. What I know of his childhood is he was a fairly balanced, popular, mainstream kid. But a revival meeting in Mississippi seems to mark the turning point." Fred Phelps' children were forced to run 10 miles a day and eat milk curds for dinner, and by the age of seven Nate could recite the names of all 66 books of the Bible in 19 seconds. "My sister tried to leave at 17 but there was just no thinking of it," Nate recalls. "I'd been at odds with my dad all my life and it escalated in my teens. When I was 16 it became clear [to me] that I was going to leave. I had to find a vehicle. So when I was 17 [in 1976] I bought a Rambler Classic for \$300 from a security guard at my high school. I had to hide it, so I kept moving it around." The second the clock struck midnight on his 18th birthday, Nate drove off in his Rambler with a box of his personal possessions, and "my first three nights [away] I slept in a gas station washroom."

Over the next 25 years Nate owned and ran a series of printing shops in California with his brother Mark, who also left. Nate married and had three children before divorcing and moving to Vancouver this past decade. Then three weeks ago he moved in with his new partner in Calgary, a Canadian woman he met on the Internet. But it was in Vancouver in October 2008 that Nate met UBC journalism student Trevor Melanson when Trevor climbed into his cab in Cranbrook, British Columbia. "As I drove him to the airport he talked about his activities as a journalism student," Nate writes in the introduction to his new website (www.natephelps.com). "Suddenly he was explaining to me about a program on the BBC about a small, radical church in Topeka, Kansas. The look of stunned confusion on his face, when I told him that was my family, will stay with me for a long time. That chance meeting turned into an award-winning article on the UBC newspaper website called *Running from hell*."

So Nate Phelps decided it was time to speak out publicly against his father. He decided he'd go wherever people invited him. On June 4, Nate Phelps addressed a gay rally for the first time in his life during Pittsburgh's Pride week, and on June 18 he gave his sixth public speech ever, at the University of Toronto's MacLeod Auditorium, a Pride Toronto-affiliated event organized by the Centre for Inquiry Canada. "This is all a work in progress for me," Nate Phelps explains. "I'm just now getting to know how historically difficult it's been for the gay community in our society." Proudly, Nate Phelps adds, "My daughter campaigned against [the ultimately successful anti-gay marriage] Proposition 8 in California and I reminded her that history is on our side. This will change." But not for Fred Phelps who knows well of his son's public campaign to discredit him. "I'm anxious sometimes," says Nate. "After 33 years some days I still feel vulnerable. It's still hard to hear my family say what they say about gays and Jews and me, but it's not enough to make me pull back."
