FIGHT IS AN AMAZING RIDE

BUCKLE UP FOR A NEW NOVEL BY DARREN HYNES BY GINA GILL

Have you ever watched a movie and thought you were part of it? Left Harry Potter wondering why your wand went astray, Mr. and Mrs. Smith thinking your husband is going to kill you in your sleep or finished The Day After Tomorrow curled up in a blanket, wondering how many hours you have until the world ends?

This is the ultimate power of Flight by Darren Hynes. Beyond any heist movie, horror film or anything you have ever experienced. You will keep yourself up at night with worry, plotting your escape route from your abusive husband. Even with the main character Emily's detailed description of her husband, Kent, and his previous physical abuse, when you hear her guestioning whether leaving him or not is the right decision, you too will ponder. Hynes actually digs deep inside the female psyche, the abused victim and skills for besides the fishery, filled with anxiety and

clinches it, grabs it so hard that the reader can relate, even though the situation may be foreign.

Flight deals with the five days leading up to Emily's final escape from her husband and her hometown. Saving small amounts of money under a floorboard for over a year, working at a local grocery store and keeping her ultimate plan to herself - the days are getting closer and closer, with the escape actually becoming a reality. Flying to B.C. and taking her two children with her, Emily barely has a plan when she arrives, but can only hold on to the fact that she will be as far away as possible.

Outside of the important flight, the small community in which Emily and her family currently reside, is suffering. Layoffs are abundant and while Kent has managed to keep his job, he has gotten the brunt of the people's unemployment. Hynes takes some small stabs at the government and points out the constant struggles of small communities. The fear of losing their history, the desperation of an entire population, their future hanging in the balance without any hope. Men and women unsure of any other trade they have helplessness as each day becomes anew. A few times Kent complains about the men in St. John's not caring for the townfolk - a serious opinion some in the capital should consider.

The powerlessness of the community coincides with everything Emily has ever felt and continues to feel; will her children hate her for taking them away from their father? What if she does not get a job in B.C.? Will she ever see her parents again? The answers are all unknown and as mentioned before, you too will be pondering the same questions, leading yourself to believe that you are part of a failing community and a destructive relationship.

Hynes is not someone to be overlooked - a man who has the power to blow his readers' minds, to create situations that become a reality and force you to say aloud "how does he do it, seriously, how?"

Pick it up and experience an over the top, heart clinching original. But be prepared to become part of a relationship you never wanted, an escape you need desperately and a sense of loss from within a deteriorated community.



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


ONE HUNDRED PAGES LATER REX GOUDIE FINDS HIMSELF ON HIS THIRD ALBUM BY DEBBY WINTERS

It's been a long and winding road for Rex Goudie from being a Canadian Idol runner up to his third album; One Hundred Pages Later, out on December 7. The result has been well worth it. Goudie has found his true calling and his true sound in this album. "It's been four pain staking years since the release of my last album and words can't describe how happy I am to finally be able to see the music that makes up One Hundred Pages Later come to fruition," says Goudie. "Every song and every note on the album is a piece of me and my experiences. They are the stories I've lived through and giving them a chance to be heard is such a weight off of me," Goudie says of the journey. The album brings out Goudie's natural ability to tell a story through lyrics. The music illustrates each tale perfectly, matching tempo, feelings and settings.

The album also showcases Goudie's unique ability to blend traditional east coast sounds with his beloved rock and roll. In the first single Comin' Back For Good, Goudie, describes how he has found a home personally and musically through his connection to east coast folk music that he was raised on melded with his discovery and love for rock and roll. The album's second track Undone was released as a stand-alone single in 2009. Though meant as an experiment – a teaser to generate interest for upcoming shows - Undone outperformed expectations by a long shot. It charted nationally on the Canadian Top 40, topped the East Coast Countdown handily and fuelled Goudie's drive to finally take the raw material for One Hundred Pages Later into the studio and do it up right. Goudie illustrates; "Writing songs is kind of like having kids;

nursing them along until the day comes and you've got to put them on the school bus and send them off. This album was like that. I had to wait until it was exactly how I wanted it before I put the youngsters on the bus."

Other tracks include Save My Life, inspired by his brother's trip 'away' to work in Alberta's oil fields, and Get Out Of My Head, a song originally written about the trials his father was having as an independent businessman, that ultimately became a metaphor for Goudie's own struggles as a musician. A track that inspires the repeat button is Won't Have to Wait a duet with Valerie Stanois, co-written with Canadian pop/punk songstress, Shiloh. Other co-writers include Casey Marshall, Eric Paul (co-writer of the Trews' Tired Of Waiting), Idle Sons and Social Code.



Goudie's sound has a soul and an independent spirit all its own; proving, finally, that while Idol may have introduced Canada to Goudie, the show never truly defined him as an individual, or an artist. One Hundred Pages Later does – unrepentantly, enthusiastically and without any doubt.

Is your loved one, significant other or family member into paper crafting, scrapbooking and card making? Well hopefully this installment of Just 2 Crafty will help you out this holiday.

Are you stumped as to what to get the crafty person on your Christmas list? Craft stores and departments can be a foreign land for some people so here is a little help.

There are two items that ever paper crafter needs. Paper, of course, and scissors! You can buy all sorts of different papers. They usually come in two different sizes 12" x 12" and the more familiar 8.5" x 11" lettersize. Decorative papers also come in smaller sizes most of the time 6" x 6" pads. The pads are a great thing to get as it allows many different combinations and the papers are designed to go together. The prices vary as much as the designs. Rest assured though a nice pack of designer or speciality paper would not be unwelcome under the tree.

Scissors are another thing that paper crafters need more than one of. There are small ones for the fine

delicate jobs and larger ones for the big cuts. Many crafters have different pairs for specific jobs such as cutting ribbon. Oh! Ribbon! What a great stocking stuffer. You can actually put it in the gift instead of around it. Although most crafters will keep the ribbons on the gifts and the paper too!

Another thing that crafters like to store a variety off are embellishments, that would be anything from brads and buttons to small flowers and chipboard shapes. Things used to fancy up a project.

If you are looking for a larger "special" gift, one suggestion may be a portable light studio. The studio folds almost flat it stores small lights and a camera tripod. When the studio is unfolded it fits on a kitchen table and is a box with dark sides and a top that you put your card or project in to take a picture of it for posting on the net, for blogs or crafting groups.



Another bigger gift would be an embosser or die cut machine. These range from small to very large in size as well as price. The newest machine of this type is the Provo Craft Cricut




Imagine which actually prints the image in colour first then makes the die cut. The Imagine retails for about \$599. If you are looking for something more affordable there is the Cuttlebug, a hand cranked die cut and embossing tool and a great place to start.

Other wonderful gift additions to any crafters space would be lighting, anything from a good desk lamp to help with colouring to a nice set of track lights lights. Storage is also precious to a crafter. Small bottles are good for buttons and bows, racks are good for ribbons and there are some great modular units specially for paper and supplies available at most craft stores.

You will always find the staff at most craft stores very helpful. If there is a favourite store where your crafter goes you might want to check it out they may have a few ideas for you too!



MORNING GLORY

STARRING RACHEL MCADAMS, HARRISON FORD AND DIANE KEATON BY TIM CONWAY

102 min. * 1/2 (one & a half stars)

Good Morning New Jersey's crackerjack assistant producer, Becky Fuller, has just been summoned by her boss. After years of starting her day when most folk aren't halfway through a night's sleep, and consistently pulling together a daily program that's always in jeopardy of falling apart in front of its viewers, there's no doubt amongst

her co-workers that she's about to finally receive a long overdue promotion. Unfortunately, the new corporate owners of the station have hired Chip, a new producer with flashy marketing credentials, but they haven't increased the operating budget. This spells "bad news" for the industrious young woman.

After bout of rejection that would discourage any other mere mortal, Becky finally gets a call from IBS, a major network that broadcasts *Daybreak*, a morning program that is consistently lagging in the ratings. While they happen to be looking for someone with a lot more experience, Becky's enthusiasm tips the scales in her favour, and she becomes the show's new executive producer.

Initially, you wonder if she's in over her head, but with her first day on the job, she scores a few minor victories that bolster confidence in her ability. Unfortunately, one of her accomplishments presents her with the challenge of finding a host for the show without spending any more money. Her solution, recruiting multiple awardwinning journalist, Mike Pomeroy, proves to be a blessing and a curse, while his professional reputation is an asset to the program, his personally is unbearable.

Most of the promotion and related coverage of *Morning Glory* seem to suggest that the film focuses on an exuberant Becky, played by Rachel McAdams, stuck between the egos of her battling co-hosts, courtesy of Harrison Ford and Diane Keaton. This is just a small element of the story, although it's not difficult to accept that confusion would arise, since it isn't clear that anyone involved with the picture knows what it's about, or even what kind of movie it's supposed to be.

It begins to make sense when you consider that the screenplay is the product of Aline Brosh McKenna, the writer of *The Devil Wears Prada*. You can see Becky as an experienced version of Anne Hathaway's character from that film, saddled with a supervisory position over an equivalent of Meryl Streep's Miranda Priestly. Instead of setting the story in the seemingly frivolous world of



high fashion, morning television, presented as devoid of substance, constitutes the landscape. As a place to start, this isn't necessarily wrong, but somewhere in the trek from concept to screen, the characters have to bear some resemblance to human beings and the story has to make sense, as well as have a point to it. Here, however, the characters, everything they do, and their respective motivations, exist only because it says so in the script.

Consequently, while Rachel McAdams can usually win you over with screen presence alone, here she is trying to entertain by repeatedly banging her head against a wall. Every move and sound from Diane Keaton is a notch above "overdoing it" and Harrison Ford, cinema's legendary "everyman" can't seem to breathe life into Mike Pomeroy. Then again, maybe no one else could.

There are few genuine moments to be found in *Morning Glory*, but when they arise, the cast does make the most of them. Still, watching talented actors struggle with lame material, and no guidance, is a painful experience. It makes you wish that Becky Fuller really existed, and had taken over the production before shooting began.





HEY ROSETTA!

THEY'RE COMING HOME AFTER A 60 DATE NORTH AMERICAN TOUR **BY DEBBY WINTERS**

Hey Rosetta! has been traveling the globe performing in China and have just finished a 60 date North American tour including opening for Sarah Harmer, Hey Rosetta are returning home! The six member Indie rock group will be on stage at the Delta Ballroom on Friday, December 17 at 9pm. They will be performing some new songs and, of course, some old favourites.

The group was formed in 2005 by front man Tim Baker. Hey Rosetta! is: Tim Baker (Vocals, Guitar, Piano), Adam Hogan (Guitar), Josh Ward (Bass), Phil Maloney (Drums), Romesh Thavanathan (cello) and Erin Aurich - (Violin).

Their most recent album, produced by Hawksley Workman; Into Your Lungs (and around in your heart and on through your blood), was released on June 3, 2008. The first single is There's an Arc. The songs Psalm and We Made a Pact are featured on the Canadian television series Flashpoint, in episodes four and seven, respectively.

Into Your Lungs... was named Album of the Year at the inaugural Verge Music Awards, held by XM Satellite Radio's The Verge, on September 24, 2008. The award, which came with a \$25,000 monetary prize, was chosen by fans via online vote.

In 2009 Hey Rosetta! took home three of the four East Coast Music Awards that they were nominated for; Group Recording of the Year, Recording of the Year, and Alternative Recording of the Year, all for the album Into Your Lungs. Tim Baker was also nominated for songwriter of the year.

In 2009 Hey Rosetta! was featured in the CBC television movie Diverted, where they performed their song I've Been Asleep for a Long, Long Time. They recorded a new song, Old Crow Black Night Stand Still, for CBC Radio 2's Great Canadian Song Quest.

Following the end of the Vancouver 2010 Winter Olympic Games the band gained attention when their song Red Heart was featured in Stephen Brunt's



stirring Olympic Montage video celebrating Canada's surging pride across the nation.

With a new album in the works, Hey Rosetta! has been touring steadily since the release of 2008's Into Your Lungs (Sonic Records), which was also included in the Polaris Music Prize Short List.

Tickets for the upcoming show at home are \$25 in advance and \$30 day of show (including tax) plus service charge, on sale since November 19. 

IN TRAINING?

WHAT ARE TRAINING BRAS ABOUT, REALLY? ARE MY TEENAGE NON-BOOBS GOING TO RUN A MARATHON? BY JOSEY VOGLES

"I got mine late and they were bigger than most," says Jennifer, 23. "I hated being the only girl with no breasts, but as soon as I got them, I hated that more. All of a sudden, boys were staring at my chest, and girls I did not even know glared at me with contempt." Yes, like it or not, breasts are the first visible (or, for some, not so visible) sign of puberty in young women. And suddenly, without any of her own doing, assumptions are made based about her on the size of her breasts. Young women who were spoken about this seemed to share a confusing mix of desire and resentment when it comes to getting boobs, as is exemplified by their first bra experiences. "Lori" remembers her mother insisting on taking her shopping for a training bra when she was eleven. "I was so embarrassed in the store - I didn't want to admit that my body was changing. I still felt like a kid."

It was in Grade 9 that a best friend boldly suggested it was time to start wearing a bra. Clueless was my feeling, looking down at the budding protrusions under my T-shirt. In a particularly sweet BFF moment, she lent me one of her bras. It was a Dici. Remember those flimsy crossover ones with the frontal closure? Hoping mom wouldn't notice, it was too embarrassing to tell her anything. After that, the solution was to sneak bras belinging to my sister until the courage was found to buy my own. In a study on adolescents and bras several years back by Merewyn Hines, a University of Toronto student at the time, one of the participants remembers the thrill of her first bra. Given to her by a friend, the bra was worn under layers of clothes during weekly horseback riding lessons, even though the young girl was almost completely flat. "It used to make me so happy knowing I had a secret, that I was wearing a bra," she recalls. "It was soooo embarrassing being one of the first girls in the class to start wearing one," recalls another woman in Hines's study. "One of my friends got one the same time I did, and she wore two tight undershirts over it so that the bra line wouldn't be obvious. I copied her, but some of the jokers in my class still managed to sneak up and snap it."

Interestingly, bras weren't even marketed to teenage girls until the 1950s. Before that, girls wore undershirts until they could fit into adult bras. Companies such as Warners, Maidenform, Formfit, Belle Mode and Perfect Form (as well as popular magazines like Good Housekeeping) started the notion of "junior figure control" and encouraged the idea that young women needed both lightweight girdles and bras to "start the figure off to a beautiful future." Basically, this was just a marketing ploy to sell bras to teenagers. Think about it. What are training bras about, really? Are my budding breasts going to run a marathon? As a bra saleswoman once said, "Training bras are not training anything." Thanks to this clever campaign, before you knew it, girls everywhere start worrying about who did and didn't wear a bra and the ability to wear and fill a bra became central to a teenage girls sense of herself, her sexuality and fitting in. "I have little boobs, and though I love them now, I used to feel so inadequate," says Jesse, a 21 year-old student. "Once I went to school with a Wonderbra on, and I guess it was obvious that my boobs had never been that big before. Some boy asked my friend what had happened to me, and I was so embarrassed I threw the bra out as soon as I got home."

"Suddenly, the body had to fit into standard sizes that were constructed from a pattern representing a norm," writes Joan Jacob Brumberg in The Body Project, a book about young women and body image. Christina remembers getting into a huge fight with her mother while shopping for her first bra. She kept insisting that she needed an AAA while her mother wanted to buy her an A-cup bra. "I assumed that AAA was bigger than A simply because there were more A's," she recalls. "When the sales lady asked me if I realized that AAA was smaller, she and my mom had a good laugh at my expense. I was mortified."



IT'S RAINING MEN! QUEEN OF HEARTS, MARTHA WASH BY RICHARD BURNETT

There are great voices and then there is the voice of legendary dance diva Martha Wash, whose soaring powerhouse vocals propelled such classic hits as *Gonna Make You Sweat* and *It's Raining Men* to the top of the charts worldwide. But when the Queen of Clubland got her start in the 1970s singing back-up with her friend Izora Armstead for the great gay disco superstar Sylvester, Martha scandalized her religious family. "I remember telling them I was going to sing in nightclubs and they were not happy!" Wash, now 57, says. "But as time passed they became supportive and even came to a few shows."

Wash and Armstead shot to international fame as Two Tons Of Fun singing on Sylvester's disco classics You Make Me Feel (Mighty Real) and Dance (Disco Heat) which both peaked at #1 for six consecutive weeks in 1978. By 1982, Wash and Armstead had been renamed The Weathergirls, went solo and recorded one of the most difficult songs to sing, It's Raining Men – and they did it in 90 minutes flat. Then Paul Jabara, who co-wrote the song with Canadian Paul Schaffer of David Letterman fame, hit the pavement: "He took acetates to all the deejays at all the clubs where it became a big hit before radio picked it up."

Filming the song's memorable video, featuring hunky bodybuilders falling from the sky – was difficult. "God, that was a cheesy video!" Martha laughs. "We filmed it in an abandoned building [in NYC] in the dead of winter. There was no heat and everybody was wearing [winter] coats. That part in the video where we fall out of the sky, well, we landed on these mattresses and found out [the next day] they were infested with bugs. For days afterwards Izora and I were scratching! It was awful!"

Worse, in the years to come, showbiz suits deemed Wash's image "unmarketable" and got models to lipsynch Martha's vocals in her massive Black Box and C+C Music Factory hits. So our girl Martha sued for proper vocal credit and royalties. She not only won, but her victory led to U.S. legislation making vocal credits mandatory on records and videos. Martha's triumph over the mostly white and largely straight music establishment cemented her icon status in a gay community that worships big-voiced, larger-thanlife divas. Wash knows it and loves her gay fans back unconditionally: "Gay audiences love me because I began singing with Sylvester. It started there."

But there's more to it than that: having met and seen Martha perform live countless times, at circuit parties, at Gay Pride festivals and at AIDS benefits, Martha always made time to meet folks afterwards. She's old school that way, like BB King and Marlene Dietrich Wash continues to perform at AIDS benefits pro bono. "I moved to New York in late 1984 and between 1985 and 1990 I got so mad because everybody said AIDS was a gay disease," Martha says. "It put such a stigma on the gay community and that was wrong. I had to do something and it was very grassroots back then. I was doing benefits to raise money to open hospices. That's how it started



[for me]. My worst period was in the mid-'90s when for a week I got a call every day about someone I knew who had passed [from AIDS]," Martha sighs. "It ravaged my circle of friends." Even her dear friend Sylvester would die of AIDS at the age of 41 in 1988. "Today I'm happy to see the [drug] cocktails are making people live longer," Martha adds, before asking, "Do you think there will be a cure?"

All this health talk is a reminder about working out, something we both loathe. At Montreal's 2006 World Outgames, Wash had lost a whopping 80 pounds. "I was supposed to go to the gym today!" Martha says. "You really got to find something you like to do and do it a lot." But Martha – also a guest judge on season two of the critically-hailed drag-queen reality TV series RuPaul's Drag Race – still shakes her groove thing onstage. She loves to dance, especially when belting out *It's Raining Men.* "People used to say 'disco sucks' and 'disco died' but they still keep playing it," Martha says happily. "Today they call it dance music, but it's still the same. It's happy music. And as long as people want to keep on dancing, I'll keep on singing too!"
